Your recent message urging
the liberalization of immigration laws
was a most welcome note. Today, with
thousands of persons overseas seeking
a safe haven of refuge from want and
persecution, America must give leadership
to the world in providing immigration
opportunities.

I hope that your broad
humanitarian principles will result
in specific action with respect to the
Mc Carran-Walter Omnibus Immigration
Bill now awaiting final Congressional
action, and that you will veto should
