Sir:

The receipt is acknowledged of your communication of January 13, 1939, regarding the contemplated visa application of Gertrud and Berndt Kirschstein.

In this connection you are informed that consideration of this case has had to be deferred owing to the fact that applications previously made are now in excess of the available quota numbers for two years at least.

There is no way under the present immigration laws and regulations in which the issuance of a visa to an applicant may be expedited. To issue a visa to an alien out of turn with other registrants on the list is a violation of law in that such action establishes a preference class not provided for in the immigration laws and regulations.
